He studied art at Campbellsville College and the University of Kentucky. He inspired and shared his love of art with his family. Helping some to receive Art scholarships. His teachings of the famous 1, 2, 3 man helped some get their start and excel in drawing and painting. His passion led to writing and illustrating novels, children's books, comic books and numerous paintings and drawings. His final dream was granted by The Dream Foundation when they published his novel 1800 Century.

James held several positions before he became disabled. He was employed at Lots Sandwich Shop, Mr. Softie and Gracie Maid Ice Cream Truck, Southwestern Tobacco Company were they nicknamed him "Tow Motor Jack" (he drove the Forklift) and worked as a counselor with his brother Melvin at the Juvenile Detention Center on Cisco Road.

James was also very proud of his 1955 Ford when he was younger. He said it was cherry in mint condition which meant like new. He also liked western pictures. he really enjoyed all of the Elvis Presley movies and songs. He had an electric guitar and taught himself to play and sing Elvis Presley songs.
